

Unemployment, inflation and GDP growth will be worse this year than projected, budget office says

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Donald Trump's tariff policy, immigration crackdowns and sweeping tax and spending law are expected to increase jobless rates and inflation and lower overall growth this year before they improve next year, according to a new report from the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office.

The CBO on Friday released new economic projections for the next three years, updating the outlook it originally released in January, before Trump's inauguration. The latest figures, which compare fourth quarter changes, show the unemployment rate, inflation and overall growth are expected to be worse this year than initially projected, while the economic picture is expected to steady in subsequent years. The CBO outlooks attempt to set expectations for the economy in order to help choices made by congressional and executive branch policymakers. It does not forecast economic downturns or recessions, with its estimates generally reverting

back to an expected average over time.

But Friday's outlook showed the degree to which Trump's choices are altering the path of the U.S. economy, suggesting that growth has been hampered in the near term by choices that have yet to show the promised upside of more jobs and lower budget deficits. Kush Desai, a White House spokesperson, told The

Associated Press, "Americans heard similar doomand-gloom forecasts during President Trump's first term, when the President's economic agenda unleashed historic job, wage, and economic growth and the first decline in wealth inequality in decades."

"These same policies of tax cuts, tariffs, deregulation, and energy abundance are set to deliver and prove the forecasters wrong again in President Trump's second term," he said.

Overall, the CBO expects real GDP growth to decrease from 2.5% in 2024 to 1.4% this year, a downgrade from the initial projection of 1.9%. The CBO attributes the projected decline to a slowdown in consumer spending stemming from new tariffs and

a decrease in immigration, which would also impact consumer spending.

The tariffs "raise prices for consumer goods and services, thereby eroding the purchasing power of households; they also increase costs for businesses that use imported and import-competing inputs in production," the report says.

However, GDP is set to grow to 2.2% in 2026, which is higher than the CBO's January prediction of 1.8%. GDP would then level off to 1.8% in 2027 and 2028, the CBO says in its latest report.

Additionally, unemployment is expected to hit 4.5% in 2025, higher than the 4.3% initially expected, according to the CBO. The jobless rate is expected to reach 4.2% in 2026 slightly lower than the 4.4% originally anticipated and even out at 4.4% in 2027 and 2028.

And inflation is now expected to hit 3.1% for the rest of 2025, according to the CBO, up from its 2.2% projection in January. Inflation would then lower to 2.4% in 2026, higher than the initial expectation of 2.1%, before leveling off at 2% the next two years. \square

ICE officer fatally shoots suspect after being dragged by car near Chicago, officials say

CHICAGO (AP) — A U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement officer fatally shot a suspect who tried to evade arrest Friday in a Chicago suburb by driving his car at officers and dragging one of them, officials said.

The shooting just outside the city follows days of threats by the Trump administration to surge immigration enforcement in the nation's third-largest city and less than a week into an operation labeled "Midway Blitz" by federal officials targeting the socalled sanctuary policies in Chicago and Illinois.

release that the officer was trying to arrest a man with a history of reckless driving who had entered the country illegally, but he refused officers' orders and instead drove his car at them. An ICE officer who was hit and dragged by the car felt his

life was threatened and opened fire, the department said.

ICE said both the officer and the driver from the shooting in the majority Hispanic suburb of Franklin Park, about 18 miles (29 kilometers) west of Chicago, were taken to a local hospital, where the suspect was pronounced dead.

"We are praying for the speedy recovery of our law enforcement officer. He followed his training, used appropriate force, and properly enforced the law to protect the public and law enforcement," Homeland Security Assistant Secretary Tricia McLaughlin said in a statement.

Illinois Gov. JB Pritzker said he is aware of the shooting and demanded "a full, factual accounting of what's happened today to ensure transparency and accountability."

Video from the scene shows police tape and traffic cones blocking off parts of the street where a large food distribution truck and gray car can be seen from a distance. Multiple law enforcement vehicles were surrounding the area.

Immigration advocates and local officials argued that the shooting represents how militarized immigration enforcement harms communities and demanded transparency and accountability from ICE agents involved in the shooting at a Friday news conference.



Trump administration to award a no-bid contract on research into vaccines and autism



NEW YORK (AP) — Federal health officials intend to award a contract to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute to investigate whether there is a link between vaccinations and autism, according to a government procurement notice.

The Troy, New York, engineering school is getting the no-bid contract because of its "unique ability" to link data on children and mothers, according to the notice posted this week.

Officials at the Department of Health and Human Services did not immediately respond to questions about the notice, including how much the contract is for or what exactly the researchers intend to do.

U.S. Health Secretary Robert F. Kennedy Jr., a leading voice in the antivaccine movement before President Donald Trump selected him to oversee federal health agencies, announced in April a "massive testing and research effort" to determine the cause of autism by this month. He has repeatedly tried to link vaccines to the condition. An RPI biotech engineering

auestion and "wouldn't be the obvious choice," Halla-

day said.

It's also not clear how the contract fits into other autism research that the government may be planning, she said.

But perhaps the biggest question is why money is being spent on such a study at all, she added.

Scientists have ruled out a link between vaccines and

autism, finding no evidence of increased rates of autism among those who are vaccinated compared with those who are not.

"The question has been studied for 20 years, multiple times by researchers around the world using millions of people, and there has never been a credible association found between vaccines and autism," Halladay said.

Those who have spent decades researching autism have found no single cause. Genetics play a role, and other factors include the age of a child's father, the mother's weight, and whether she had diabetes or was exposed to certain chemicals.

Whatever amount is being spent on the project could instead be going to "other important research questions," including studies of genetics and environmental factors, Halladay said.

"I think that's the most frustrating part," she said.

For months, HHS officials have been trying to use vaccine safety data compiled by the CDC to look for harms that might be tied to shots. 🔲

professor, Juergen Hahn, has used artificial intelligence and machine learning techniques to look for patterns in blood samples of children with autism. Hahn "is renowned for the quality and rigor of his research," RPI officials said in a statement acknowledging the intended grant.

"If this project is awarded, he intends to publish the results of his work at the con-

clusion of the project," the statement added.

The Associated Press left messages seeking comment from Hahn.

The notice raises many questions, said Alycia Halladay, who oversees research activities and grants for the Autism Science Foundation.

Suspect in Charlie Kirk killing became more political, opposed activist's views, authorities say

OREM, Utah (AP) — A 22-year-old Utah man who was arrested and booked on murder charges in the assassination of Charlie Kirk held deep disdain for the conservative activist's provocative viewpoints and indicated to a family member that he was responsible for the shooting, authorities said Friday.

The arrest marked a major break in a case that shocked the country and raised fresh alarms about political violence in a deeply polarized United States.

Tyler Robinson had become "more political" in the run-up to the shooting and mentioned during a dinner with family that Kirk would be visiting Utah, Gov. Spencer Cox said at a news conference. The Republican governor cited as evidence engravings on bullet casings found in the rifle that authorities be-

lieve was used in the attack, as well as chat app messages attributed to the suspect that a roommate shared with law enforcement.

The governor credited Robinson's family with helping turn him over to authorities. "Ladies and gentlemen, we got him," Cox said soon after the arrest was first heralded by President Donald Trump on the Fox News show "Fox & Friends."

Robinson is believed to have acted alone, and the investigation is ongoing, Cox said. because of his outsize influ-

He was arrested on suspicion of capital murder, weapons and obstruction offenses. He was expected to be formally charged Tuesday ahead of an initial court appearance. Robinson's arrest late Thursday capped a frenetic dayand-a-half search that just hours earlier seemed stuck when authorities pleaded for tips and leads from the public. The assassination while Kirk was speaking at Utah Valley University reverberated across the country

"This is our moment: Do we escalate or do we find an off-ramp?" Cox asked, making an impassioned plea for young people to bridge differences through common ground rather than violence. "It's a choice."

New details on evidence Authorities, who have yet to reveal a motive, described evidence they said shed potential light on the slaying. That included the engravings on bullet casings, including one that said, "Hey, fascist! Catch!" Cox said.

In addition, a roommate shared with authorities messages from the chatting app Discord that involved a contact named Tyler and discussed a rifle wrapped in a towel, engraved bullets and a scope, the governor said. A Mauser .30-caliber, bolt-action rifle was found in

a towel in a wooded area along the path investigators believe Robinson took after firing a single shot from a distant roof and then fleeing. The clothes the suspect wore when confronted by law enforcement late Thursday matched what he had on when he arrived on campus, and a family member confirmed he drove a gray Dodge Challenger like the one seen in surveillance video that recorded Robinson driving to the university the day of the shooting, Cox said.

Robinson's father recognized him from the photos released by the FBI and told him to turn himself in. Robinson refused at first, but then changed his mind, according to a law enforcement official who spoke on the condition of anonymity to discuss an ongoing investigation. His father contacted their youth pastor, who also occasionally works with the U.S. Marshals and called the agency so Robinson could turn himself in.

Judge tells Trump to update immigration website for Venezuelans with temporary protected status

President Donald Trump's administration must update its immigration services website to reflect that 600,000 Venezuelans with temporary protected status are legally allowed to live and work in the United States, a federal unlawfully canceled tempojudge ordered.

U.S. District Judge Edward Chen ordered Trump's Republican administration to change its U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services website after plaintiffs' lawyers said temporary protect-

U.N. assembly votes overwhelmingly to back two-state solution to Israel-Palestinian conflict

U.N. General Assembly voted overwhelmingly Friday to support a two-state solution to the Israel-Palestinian conflict and urge Israel to commit to a Palestinian state, which Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu vehemently opposes.

The 193-member world body approved a nonbinding resolution endorsing the "New York Declaration," which sets out a phased plan to end the nearly 80year conflict. The vote was 142-10 with 12 abstentions. Hours before the vote, Netanyahu said "there will be no Palestinian state." He spoke at the signing of an agreement to expand settlements that will divide the West Bank, which the Palestinians insist must be part of their state, saying, "This place belongs to us.'



The United States, Israel's closest ally, reiterated its opposition to the New York Declaration and the General Assembly resolution endorsing implementation of the two-state solution.

The resolution "is yet another misguided and ill-timed publicity stunt that undermines serious diplomatic efforts to end the conflict," U.S. Mission counselor Morgan Ortagas said. "Make no mistake, this resolution is a gift to Hamas."

The eclaration condemns "the attacks committed by Hamas against civilians" in southern Israel on Oct. 7, 2023, a rare condemnation by Arab nations of Hamas. The Hamas-led militants killed about 1,200 people, mainly Israeli civilians, and took about 250 hostage. Of those, 48 are still being held, including about 20 who are believed to be alive.

Albania's prime minister appoints an Algenerated 'minister' to tackle corruption

TIRANA, Albania (AP) — Albania's prime minister on Friday tapped an Artificial Intelligence-generated 'minister' to tackle corruption in his new Cabinet, a project launched with the help of Microsoft.

Officially named Diella the female form of the word for sun in the Albanian language the new Al minister is a virtual entity.

Diella will be a "member of the Cabinet who is not present physically but has been created virtually," Prime Minister Edi Rama said in a post on Facebook.

Rama said the Al-generated bot would help ensure that "public tenders will be 100% free of corruption" and will help the government work faster and with full

Diella was created in cooperation with Microsoft, using Al's up-to-date models and techniques to guarantee accuracy in offering the duties it is charged with, an official at Albania's National Agency for Information Society said.

The official was not authorized to talk to reporters and spoke on condition of anonymity. The agency manages the administration's information systems.

Diella, depicted as a figure in a traditional Albanian folk costume, was launched earlier this year as a virtual assistant on the e-Albania public service platform, where she has helped users navigate the site and get access to about 1 million digital documents.

Rama's Socialist Party secured a fourth consecutive term after winning 83 of the 140 Assembly seats in the May 11 parliamentary elections. The party can govern alone and pass most legislation, but it needs a twothirds majority, or 93 seats, to change the Constitution. The Socialists have said it can deliver European Union membership for Albania in five years, with negotiations concluding by 2027. The pledge has been met with skepticism by the Democrats, who contend Albania is far from prepared.

The Western Balkan country opened full negotiations to join the EU a year ago. The new government also faces the challenges of fighting organized crime and corruption, which has remained a top issue in Albania since the fall of the communist regime in 1990.



Belarus forcibly deported political prisoners after U.S. deal, opposition says

VILNIUS, Lithuania (AP) —

Belarus has been accused of the "forced deportation" of dozens of political prisoners released in a U.S.led deal, opposition leader Sviatlana Tsikhanouskaya said Friday.

Belarus freed 52 political prisoners Thursday as part of a deal brokered by the United States, which lifted some sanctions on the country's national airline.

The deal is the latest step toward a possible rapprochement between Washington and Minsk, a close ally of Russia that has faced Western isolation for

"Of course, we are so happy to see people free, but let's be honest, what happened yesterday wasn't real freedom. It was forced deportation," Tsikhanouskaya told a news conference Friday.

She said that her team would work with partners in the U.S. to stop the practice for future releases.

About half of those released were approaching the end of their prison terms, said Tsikhanouska-

"People were counting the days and months until their release, and suddenly they are deported, separated from their families; they have no passports, and they cannot return," he said.

Fifty-one of the freed prisoners crossed into Lithuania, Anatol Lyabedzka,

told The Associated Press.

At a press conference in Vilnius, many alleged they were tortured, that they were deprived of medical care and contact with lawyers and relatives, and that other prisoners were encouraged to abuse and humiliate them. They thanked U.S. President Donald Trump for their release.

Trade union leader Aliaksandr Yarashuk, 74, who was sentenced to four years in prison, said that the authorities had "created a torture factory for political prisoners."

"I once almost died of cold in a punishment cell; I thought I would not survive the night," he said.

Blogger Mikalai Dzjadok spent a year of his five-year

sentence in solitary confinement, where he says authorities deprived him of medical care and visits with lawyers and relatives.

"If people from the civilized world saw what a punishment cell is, they would think they were in the Middle Ages," Dzjadok said. "The world simply cannot imagine the scale of what is happening in Belarus, the human rights violations, the abuse, violence of all kinds: psychological, physical, sexual."

The Belarusian government has not commented on the situation.

One of the released prisoners, veteran opposition politician Mikalai Statkevich, refused to cross into Lithuania and tried to return to Belarus, but was blocked by border guards, Anatol Lyabedzka said.

Statkevich remained between the two countries' borders for a while before Belarusian security operatives took him in the direction of the Belarusian border crossing, Lyabedzka said.

His whereabouts are currently unknown, Tsikhanouskaya said.

Official says gangs killed dozens in small fishing village in Haiti's latest massacre

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — Dozens of people were killed in a fishing village north of Haiti's capital in the latest massacre carried out by powerful gangs in the troubled Caribbean country, an official said Fri-

At least 42 people were killed in Labodrie, including a 4-year-old child and his family, said Joseph Louis Baptiste, a local government official.

He told Radio Caraïbes that the killings began over the weekend and are ongoing.

"This tragedy highlights the urgent need for effective state intervention to end impunity and restore security in the region," he said. Baptiste said gangs set La-

bodrie on fire and are now trying to attack the nearby town of Arcahaie, with police and a local vigilante group trying to hold them back.

Baptiste said the massacre apparently was provoked by the killing of a local gang leader in Cabaret who goes by the name of Vladimir. He was a member

tion known as Viv Ansanm that has plundered several communities in Port-au-Prince and beyond and was recently designated as a foreign terrorist organization by the U.S.

Baptiste called on police to help protect people in Labodrie and Arcahaie.

Lionel Lazarre, a deputy spokesman for Haiti's National Police, did not immediately return a message for comment.

The department is understaffed and underfunded and is struggling to quell gang violence despite help from a U.N.-backed mission led by Kenyan police.

Gangs previously attacked Arcahaie in October last year, wounding multiple

people and setting fire to

Gang violence used to be concentrated in Port-au-Prince but in recent years has spread to once peaceful communities outside of the capital.

Earlier this month, the U.S. and Panama said they supported transforming the current multinational force into a 5,550-member force with the power to detain and arrest suspected gang members.

Meanwhile, the security firm of former U.S. Navy Seal Erik Prince is expected to deploy nearly 200 personnel from various countries to Haiti as part of a oneyear deal to quell gang violence there.

After Germany invaded The Netherlands, Dutch authorities ordered the confinement of the ship's German crew, who were ported in Aruba because it needed to find a neutral port. The Dutch ordered the ship to be confiscated, but the German crew had other plans. Taking advantage of a delay caused by an anticipated armed resistance, the Germans started scuttling the ship, opening her seacock and setting her ablaze.

Eventually, the crew was arrested, but SS Antilla could



not be saved by the Dutch forces. The Dutch fired two rounds of their 35mm gun aboard the 'Aruba' at SS Antilla and left her to sink.

The shipwreck can only be reached by boat. The ship is visible from the surface and during your snorkeling trip you'll be surrounded by hundreds of tropical fishes, but the shipwreck alone is already impressive enough.

SS Pedernales

Like the Antilla, the story of SS Pedernales dates to WWII. Pedernales was used as a lake tanker between Venezuela and Aruba, and sailed Pedernales lies on the north-

under British Flag. At this time, The US and Britain were using Aruba and Curacao as fuel stations for the war ships.

Under operation Neuland (disruption of British and American oil sources), Germany fleets bombed Pedernales. The ship was later cut into three sections, two of which were taken to the US for reconstruction. The remaining part stayed in Aruba and was used as target practice. Eventually, the ship became a snorkeling site that has attracted many visitors throughout the years.

west coast of Aruba, and is no more than 10 feet under water, making it an ideal site for snorkelers and divers of all levels.

Jane Sea Wreck

The Jane Sea Wreck lies near Palm Island at 100 feet underwater. Jane's story is heavily speculated, making her origin a tale of legends.

Launched in 1959, the 190feet ship was initially called "Blackthorn". Her last owner, S&D Shipping Ltd. named her Jane Sea. Jane was a cement freighter between Venezuela and Aruba.

The story goes that the Jane Sea arrived one day at the Barcadera Harbor, where Aruban customs discovered several tons of cocaine. The ship was confiscated and petitioned went out for her owner to claim her. However, several years went by and no one came forward to claim the ship, so dive operators decided to sink her as an artificial reef. This happened in 1988. Jane Sea earned the nick name Jane C, because of the illicit white powder discovered on board.

Jane is now beautifully overgrown with coral and is home to a diverse set of marine life, like turtles, octopus, crabs and sometimes even nurse sharks.

The stories behind these shipwrecks enriches their exploration and offers snorkelers and divers a glance into the past, as well as the beautiful marine life that have molded these wrecks into their home. So, grab your equipment and discover another side of what Aruba has to offer!

We highly recommend you embark on your adventure with the guide of a professional and be sure to take of yourself and Aruba's precious nature.

Lessons from our elders: Plants and fruits for medicinal use

(Oranjestad)— Though western medicine is now widely used for common illnesses and to keep our bodies healthy and happy, it is still very common in every household in Aruba (and around the world) to have staple home remedies that is passed on through generations. Here are some tips that our elders have passed on to us over the years.

Sweet potato

According to our elders, sweet potato is mostly useful for low blood pressure. People who suffer from low blood pressure were advised to eat sweet potato 2 to 3 times a week. However, if you have high blood pressure, it is best not to eat too much sweet potato, as this raises blood pressure. Sweet potatoes are also great for people who work hard labor jobs, and it's been said to be aid blood circulation in the body, as well as help those with hemorrhoids or diarrhea.

Many of our elders opted to plant sweet potatoes themselves, mostly because of how easy it was to do so. Cut the end of a sweet potato let it sit in shallow water until it starts to sprout. Then you may plant it in the ground. Sweet potatoes need plenty of water to grow, especially in the first week in the ground. It was said that once you start to notice the ground crack underneath the flowers, it is time to harvest. This should happen around month 3.

Pomegranate

Pomegranates are also one of the easier fruits to plant and harvest. Originated from Persia, this plant can grow almost everywhere. In Aruba, there are many homes that have a tiny or big pomegranate tree. You may be wondering what the difference is between a small and big pomegranate tree, for which the answer is based on harvest time. Tiny trees produce tinier pomegranates that can be harvested early on. Contrarily, big trees produce bigger pomegranates, but



they need enough time to fully ripen before harvesting, otherwise you might end up with bitter seeds. Pomegranate trees are also very easy to plant. In essence, if you just throw the seeds on the ground, they could grow into a tree.

In terms of medicinal use, pomegranate skins are said to have a few benefits for our health. According to customs, pomegranate

skin tea can help those that suffer from diarrhea. Dried pomegranate skin tea is also good for people who have worms. Pomegranate flowers can be boiled to make a drink and this can be used for irritated gums; just take a swig and let the tea sit in your mouth for a couple minutes.

Aruba's Nature is to be Cherished

The national park Arikok comprises almost 18 % of the island. Its rugged terrain, desert-like hills filled with tall cacti, breathtaking coastline and protected local flora and fauna welcome you to be explored. There is numerous wildlife to discover like for example the sea turtle who lays his eggs on the park's beaches. There are more places on the island that are a preserved area like the Bubali Plas which is a bird sanctuary.

The national park Arikok takes you on a memorable journey of the island's past offering unique geological, cultural and historical sites. These can all be enjoyed and explored either on your own or during guided tours. A wide variety of educational and informative programs and fun activities is available.

Did you know that four of the in total seven species of sea turtle lay their eggs on Aruba's beaches? In the national park, a Least Tern (Sternula antillarum) keeps a strict eye on a very special event taking place below on the beach: a majestic Leatherback (Dermochelys coriacea) heads back to sea after laying her eggs, while another nest laid 2 months ago by the same female hatches. A very rare occurrence of daytime nesting and hatching. Sea turtles prefer nesting in the cool and dark hours of the night. And hatchlings usually wait for the cue of cooling surface sand before emerging.

Bubali Magic

This beautiful close-up image of the pink bird is courtesy of Michiel Oversteegen of the Aruba Birdlife Conservation. This important foundation showcases and builds awareness of Aruba's birds and other native flora and fauna. You may have seen a 'pink cloud' lately at the Bubali or Spanish Lagoon Wetlands areas? It's most likely to be Roseate Spoonbills (Ajaia ajaja) or 'Chucharon Cora' as they are known in Papiamento. This unusual looking bird forages in shallow muddy water while sweeping its flattened bill



from side to side to catch small fish, crustaeceans and other aquatic invertebrates. The Roseate Spoonbill remains an uncommon sight as they are vulnerable to degradation of feeding and nesting habitats (Wetlands). (Source: arikok national park)

Motorized vehicles are forbidden to drive on the sand dunes in the Northern part of the island and all beaches in Aruba are forbidden for any motorized vehicle. Cas di Torto



Cas di torto (also called cas di lodo or cas di bara) is a traditional building technique from Aruba. It refers to a type of houses made of mud with rounded corners. These houses were usually found around the plantations. The few structures that still exist are the oldest structures that are left standing in the country.

The technique probably came over from the Venezuelan Paraguaná Peninsula

in the 18th century. Existing houses date back 150 years. Until 1925 many houses on Aruba were built using this technique, afterwards it fell into disuse. In 2005 there were 62 cas di torto houses left, of which only four were in good condition.

The skeleton of the houses is made up of round wooden poles placed with distances of 1.5 feet between them. Branches are interwoven between them, completing



the structural support. On this basis, loam is applied, mixed with sand, water and para grass. This is then coated with aloe vera juice, which gives the white colour and helps to protect against the weather.

On top of the poles pieces of wood are fitted that serve as the base for the roof beams. Until 1815 the roofing usually

consisted of corn (maize) stems, afterwards the nuclei of columnar cacti were used. The floor is made of loam, mixed with cement or cow dung.

The houses were usually divided into a kitchen, a living room, a porch and a bedroom. In the kitchen would be a wooden or metal bar-

rel for storing water that was collected in small rain ponds. Around this barrel a thick loam wall would be erected. Often large families would live in these houses; people would sleep on mats on the floor.

If you visit the Arikok National Park you will be able to see a very nice cas di torto.

Why You Should Not Miss Aruba's Free City Center Street Car Tour

(Oranjestad)—Aruba's City Center Street Car – or as we call it in Dutch; "Tram van Oranjestad, the capital city of Aruba. It was inaugurated on 22 December 2012, being the first and so far the only passenger rail service on Aruba and the rest of the Dutch Caribbean. There are two trolleys, a single-deck one with 42 seats and a double-decker with 64 seats. The line was inspired by the popular battery-powered street-car operation at the Grove in Los Angeles, USA. Aruba's streetcars are powered by hydrogen fuel cells, which are charged by the island's year-round trade winds.

Caya Betico Croes, mostly referred to as our "main street" has been developed into a pollution-free pedestrian mall. The double-decker

offers you a 360 degree view of the down town area with a picture perfect scenery of the island's clear blue skies. Who would not enjoy a ride on this beautiful and naturally air-conditioned vehicle? The tour consists of a total of 9 stops approximately 200 meters apart from



each other; all stops are clearly marked. The tram will bring you close to different museums, historical plazas, monuments, the Protestant church, Aruba's high- end mall, retail shops, and a variety of local and international cuisine restaurants. The "I love Aruba" trademark also belongs to that list. The third stop on the route is close to a 5-minute walk to the famous Renaissance Marina showcasing luxurious yachts and Aruba's blue waters.

The "Tram van Oranjestad" starts from a balloon loop near the Port of Call and serves the downtown area and ends at Plaza Nicky. The first ride starts at 10:00 am sharp with intervals of 25minutes. The last trolley departs from the cruise port at 5:00 pm. Don't miss this tour of the beautiful Aruba's City Center – it is free for all!



Visit the island's popular cave sites!

(Oranjestad)—Among the Arikok National Park, Aruba sand and cacti, there are two caves hidden in the outskirts of San Nicolas, in the north-eastern area of the island. These caves, The Quadiriki cave and The Fontein Cave are open to visitors of the Arikok Nadecide to take an "offroad" tour in the park, be sure to visit these prehistoric caves...and be sure to bring a flashlight!

Quadirikiri Cave

Known for its two chambers accompanied by a skylight, the Quadikiri Cave is the most popular cave among locals and tourists, as it is easy to walk through and provides great lighting for pictures.

The most well-known legend behind the cave could be considered as Aruba's first love tional Park, so if you ever story, as it tells the tale of the undying love between the chief's daughter and her beloved. As legend would have it, the chief disapproved of his daughter's choice of lover, as he thought him unworthy. Stubborn and filled with anger, the daughter refused to turn away her beloved.

> So, the chief decided to lock her up in the Quadirikiri Cave, in hopes that she would soon calm down and turn away her lover. Her beloved, in turn, was



locked away in the Tunnel of Love (Now known as the

Huliba Cave).

Through the pathways underneath the Tunnel of Love running up to the Quadiriki cave, the two love bird found each other, and refused to let each other go. Because of their stubbornness, they both died in the Quadiriki Cave, their ascending spirits burning two holes in the ceiling of the cave. This is why the cave has two holes through which sunlight passes through to illuminate the chamber.

Though there have been discoveries of Amerindian drawing on the wall, these have mostly been ruined by vandalism. However, the Fontein Cave further up north, provides a better glimpse in prehistoric Amerindian paintings.

Fontein Cave

Longer than the Quadirikiri Cave, the Fontein Cave contains pathways that stretch to the limestone walls further down. Here is also where prehistoric drawings can be seen. Though this cave does not Do note that these caves have its own legend, this was speculated to have been occupied—or at least used by prehistoric Arawak settlers on the island for rituals and other spiritual ceremonies.

The Huliba Cave/ Tunnel of

The Huliba Cave, formerly known as the Tunnel of Love, was once open to the public, and was the biggest and most accessible of all three caves. This cave had five chambers, including one that is heartshaped. This cave had narrow stairs that led to long pathways deep into the cave, with a staircase leading to the exit on the other side. In one of the chambers, there used to be the carving of the Virgin Mary, put there for the protection of the cave.

However, the Huliba Cave has been permanently closed for a few years now, as a way to preserve the bat population that lives in the cave. These Long Tongue Fruit Bats and Insect Eater Bats are very important to the ecosystem of the island. Though this cave is no longer accessible to the public, it surely is interesting to learn more about the history of these caves and the Arawak tribes that resided or utilized them.

are very dark, humid, hot, and are inhabited by bats. Do wear comfortable clothing and shoes, as the pathways in these caves may be rough and bumpy, and don't forget to bring a flashlight!





The district of Savaneta: A quick history guide to the island's first capital

(Oranjestad)—Before Oranjestad became the island nation's capital, Aruba's first capital was the district of Savaneta. Here is where the cultural identity of Aruba was born, and from where the rest of the island developed into what it is today.

Savaneta is said to have been the first place where the Caquetio inhabitants first stepped foot on the island. Though there isn't hard evidence to back this up, but considering the legend of the Cacique Arua, it is believed that there were already movements on Aruba—and Savaneta—around 88 AD.

The Caquetios probably made their way to the island either from Venezuela, Colombia or other Caribbean islands in the region, but with good weather it was relatively easy for them to travel back and forth in their canoes. So, since the Caquetios discovered the island, Aruba found her first form of civilization.

It wasn't until 1499 when Aruba met another group of people who set foot on the island: the Spanish explorer Alonso de Ojeda. De Ojeda first took notice of Aruba off the coast of Venezuela, during his exploration of the Latin American country. This was on August 9th, 1499. However, de Ojeda didn't actually sail to the island till 4 days later, on August 23rd, 1499. This was the beginning of the Spanish era on Aruba (1499-1636).

Alonso usually didn't stop at every island or land he saw, especially not in the Caribbean. He would often take





notice of land from afar and continue sailina. However, Aruba was an exception. He had heard that there were "quebracho" trees on the island, which were commonly used to produce dve or paint. But since these trees could not be found in Savaneta, he continued to search in the area of what is now known as Santa Cruz. The best way to transport the tree barks was via a route passing through Savaneta, and so the first road between Savaneta and Santa Cruz was made.

The Dutch colonial era (1636-1805)

between The Netherlands and Spain, Dutch explorers and merchants began to travel to the ABC islands. Once they landed in Aruba, they deported the small Arawakan and Spanish community that was living on the island. This was the beginning of colonization of the ABC islands by the Dutch empire. Around the same, the West Indian Company (WIC) was born. Bonaire and Curacao were mostly used for plantations, where the Dutch had transported slaves from Africa. Aruba, on the other hand, was mostly used to raise cattle and to house the haring factory. The During the 80-year war Dutch had often forced the

indigenous community to work for them.

In 1636, when the Netherlands won the war against Spain, the country surrendered the islands to the Dutch.

The Dutch administration appointed the island's first commander, an Irish man named N. Williams. Because the Dutch were interested in other Caribbean islands and countries in South America, they imported Dutch merchants and business men, all of whom resided in Savaneta. This way, Savaneta officially became the island's first capital.


However, at the end of the 18th century, the commander at the time, J.R. Lauffer, moved his office to what is now "Horse Bay" in Oranjestad. Because the highest office on the island moved away from Savaneta, the capital lost its title to what was called then Playa.

How Savaneta got its name

The name Savaneta probably has a Spanish origin. It was said that when the Spanish climbed a hill called Yara, they saw that the area was mostly open and had no big trees. In Spanish, such a land area is called a "sabana".

Because of its land surface, Savaneta was a great place to construct cattle farms. From here, the farmer culture on Aruba was born. Before the Aruban Gold Rush and the construction of the Refinery in San Nicolas, most residents were farmers, and Savaneta had many inhabitants that farmed fruits and vegetables. They also continued the tradition of raising cattle, like goat, sheep, pigs and horses. Savaneta was one of the first places on the island to have a general farming culture. From this culture, many other traditions were born, like the Dera Gay Holiday that we celebrate every year on June 24th.

Supermarket hours

Supermarket hours may vary depending on where you are staying on the island. Generally though, most supermarkets are open from 8am to 8 or 10pm, Monday through Saturday. On Sundays, supermarkets generally close earlier; mostly around 2pm.



Drinking water

The water that flows through the sinks of every house, hotels and other establishments is distilled and perfectly safe to drink. Aruba's drinking water exceeds WHO's international standards for water quality, so there is no need to buy bottled water from the store.



Safety

Since February 2024, Aruba has been categorized as the safest country in the Caribbean by The Telegraph, and many tourist that visit have often told us how they feel safe to explore the island or walk around at night. However, rare incidents do occurs, so keep yourself and your belongings safe.

LONDON (AP) — The summer holidays are over, and all those great times you had on vacation have been memorialized in hundreds of smartphone photos. Now what?

Some highlights the prettiest sunset, the best group shots have been posted on Instagram or shared in the family chat group. But many more will likely languish in your camera roll.

Because smartphones come with increasingly large amounts of file storage, it's too easy to take photos just because we can. But it's also real work to go through them all later, so it's too easy to forget about them.

Here are some quick and easy methods to help deal with the pictures (and videos) overwhelming your phone.

Pick your favorites

There will some shots that will be the most important standout photos that you want to share with others, or know that you'll look back on years later, or just keep for reference. Star or heart any photos that fall into this category, which puts them into a folder or album for favorites.

Delete, with help

After a recent extended family trip to Turkey, I ended up with quite a few photos of restaurant and cafe menus. They were shared in the family WhatsApp group to decide where or what to eat. But we'll probably never visit those establishments again.

It's always good practice to cull photos that you just don't need anymore, which could also include screenshots, pictures of receipts or duplicate images. But going through hundreds of trip photos could be a little tedious without some help. Fortunately, there are dozens of photo deletion and cleanup apps available that aim to speed the job up.

Many of them resemble dating apps like Tinder, because they let you swipe left to delete and swipe

right to save a photo. Some are free, others need a subscription.

It starts getting more challenging when you have images that are similar but not identical. Which one should you keep? Some apps have a comparison feature to help you decide. I tried a few of these apps and found that Clever Cleaner's Similars function works well, helping me whittle down, for example, many of the various nearly identical shots I took of Istanbul's skyline while crossing the Bosphorus Strait by ferry at dusk. The free app grouped similar pictures together and then suggested the best shot to keep. I found that I generally agreed with its suggestions.

Tips to help organize your photos

Even if you've managed to sort through your camera roll, it will probably still be a jumble of images stretching back in an unbroken

So group photos into albums organized by themes. Android and iPhone users can do this on the Photos apps on their respective operating systems. Select all the photos from a trip and add them to a new album.

Planning ahead will make this process easier. Create an album when you start your trip, then save the photos there as you take them.

You can also create a shared album on Android or iPhone, which lets other people view or comment on photos or add their own.

If you don't want to set up

and Google Photos lets users create links so others can just view an album or individual photo. It's not so easy on iOS, which only lets users export the album's photos. You can share individual photos with an iCloud link but it expires after 30 days. Remember to print

a shared album, Android

Now that you've edited and curated your holiday pictures, consider taking an analog approach to showing them off.

Print them out and put them in an album that people can flip not scroll through.

Or blow up the most eyecatchina shot to frame and hang it as wall art.

A new Whitney Houston duet? How Calum Scott made 'I Wanna Dance with Somebody' with the late star

NEW YORK (AP) — It sounds impossible, but that's the magic of it. On Thursday, a new Whitney Houston song arrives 13 years after her death.

English singer Calum Scott is responsible. The single is a duet between Scott and Houston, a balladic reinterpretation of the timeless "I Wanna Dance with Somebody (Who Loves Me)," using Houston's original vocal stems. (Stems are the individual musical elements that, when combined, make up a song.)

"It wasn't even something I could have dreamt as a possibility, and the fact that I'm getting to do it is, geez, one of the honors of my career," Scott told The Associated Press. Houston's voice is one that soundtracked his childhood courtesy his mom and he refers to Houston as one of the most influential performers in his life and the lives of many. "Timeless," he describes her. Here's how the new song

came into existence. Recording with a giant

an undertaking couldn't be possible without the approval of a number of parties. Specifically, it required Pat Houston, Whitney's sister-in-law and the executor of her estate, and Primary Wave, which acquired the copyrights to hit Whitney Houston songs as part of a 2022 deal.

Pat Houston says the idea for Scott's "I Wanna Dance Somebody (Who Loves Me)" actually came from Primary Wave. They were familiar with Scott's live cover version of the song from his stint opening for Ed Sheeran in 2024. On that tour, Scott stripped the 1987 classic down into a ballad, blending it with Robyn's "Dancing On My

lad, while also taking into consideration that 2025 marks the 40th anniversary of Houston's music career Pat Houston was on board. It was yet another opportunity for celebration. "I said, you know what, this is a nobrainer. This is the Houston style. So, let's go with this," she said.

"Whitney was a balladeer and that's why we all fell in love with her," she continued. "And Calum turned the song into a beautiful ballad."

Associated Press First, the Houston estate

and Primary Wave provided Scott with the original vocal stems, produced by her longtime producer Narada Michael Walden. Then Scott recorded the song with producers Jon "MAGS" Maguire, Andrew Yeates and Charlie T in the U.K. in "about a week," he recalls. They were joined by a string section, which gave additional dimension to their somber take on the song.

"Take a pop song and make it sad," Scott jokes of his approach.


Recording the ballad made sense because, as Scott points out, the lyrics to the original song are a bit melancholic. "You want to dance with somebody who loved you, you know, you're not actually dancing with them," he says. It's about yearning. But in an early demo, the chorus was recorded in a minor chord which sounded a bit too depressing. The change was made swiftly; even slowed, the song needed some of that Houston ebullience.

Another early decision: The new song would start with just Houston's voice, alone, in the first verse. "Whitney starts the song because this is her song," Scott says simply. "I would never dare stand in front of Whitney for that first verse."

Eagle-eyed (eared?) fans might notice the sound of a snare drum bleeding into her vocal on that verse because it was originally recorded to tape, not digitally, and because "we can't change anything like that because those are etched into the song and into her vocal," says Scott. "And to remove it would be taking a piece away."

It's one of the reasons they kept the song's iconic key change in the last chorus as well.

"I really had to dig for those high notes," he says of the recording.

Book Review: Evidence of historian David McCullough's curiosity abounds in 'History Matters'

The late Pulitzer Prize-winning historian David McCullough told an audience in 2012 that writing history was like working on a detective case.

"And once on the case, you want to know more and more and more," he said in remarks at Dartmouth College. "Follow your curiosity."

One thing that's clear after reading "History Matters," a posthumous collection of McCullough's writings and speeches that include his Dartmouth remarks, is how much the revered historian practiced what he preached. The book is an enjoyable complement to McCullough's canon of works that include biographies of John Adams, Theodore Roosevelt and a reminder of why he was one of the greatest historians of our time. They also

offer a glance into his approaches to reading and writing. In a tribute to the late novelist Herman Wouk that's part of the collection, McCullough underscores the importance of feeling and narrative writing for historians. Another tribute to novelist, painter and historian Paul Horgan shows how McCullough approached his writing with a painter's

The writings also include a short history of his typewriter, a second-hand Royal Standard that he bought in 1965 and used to write every one of his 12 books. A recommended reading list from McCullough underscores how much he viewed literature as necessary for understanding history. Throughout the book, McCullough's remarks display concerns about the consequences of historical illiteracy. His pieces also illustrate the power of helping out younger writers and connecting with them.



No preseason was no problem for Josh Allen, Lamar Jackson, Aaron Rodgers

Josh Allen and Lamar Jackson didn't play a snap in the preseason.

They didn't need it.

Allen and Jackson were spectacular in their first game action of the season. Jackson led the Baltimore Ravens to a 15-point, fourth-quarter lead only to watch Allen rally the Buffalo Bills to a 41-40 victory. So much for rust.

Allen was 33 of 46 for 394 yards with two touchdown passes and two more rushing. Jackson was 14 of 19 for 209 yards and two TDs plus 70 yards rushing and another score.

"It's trusting, trusting our process, trusting our other 10 guys on the football field, trusting what Joe's (offensive coordinator Joe Brady) calling, and really sticking to our fundamentals and how we worked during training camp, and really just trying to pick up where we left off from last year," Allen said on the AP's "On Football" podcast.

The reigning NFL MVP sat out the entire preseason for the first time in his career. But Allen was sharp against a tough defense. He had 251 of his passing yards in the fourth quarter.

Jackson, a two-time MVP and three-time All-Pro, hasn't played in the preseason since 2021. He just steps on the field and dazzles whenever he gets an

opportunity.

NFL coaches have to make difficult decisions each preseason, choosing whether to rest starters or put quarterbacks in harm's way in meaningless games.

Green Bay's Jordan Love injured his hand in an exhibition game but was ready to play in Week 1.

Sitting out doesn't mean guys will be ineffective. Allen and Jackson demonstrated that. So did Aaron Rodgers.

Playing in preseason games doesn't guarantee success early in the season, either. Football is a team sport. There are a lot of factors that determine a quarterback's performance and whether an offense clicks right from the start.

Rodgers was among the 10 starting quarterbacks who didn't get any reps in exhibition games. He was outstanding in the opener, tossing four TD passes to lead Pittsburgh to a win. Some of the others had

slower starts.
Baker Mayfield was out of sync early for Tampa Bay but made clutch throws to rally the Buccaneers to victory.

Dak Prescott posted a 76.6 passer rating, though the Cowboys had several dropped passes.

Jared Goff and Detroit's

entire offense had a rough time against Green Bay in John Morton's first game as offensive coordinator.

Meanwhile, quarterbacks who played in the preseason had mixed results.

Joe Burrow threw for just 113 yards and one TD but Cincinnati still edged Cleveland 17-16.

Patrick Mahomes lost another wide receiver to injury and needed a while to get Kansas City's offense going in a loss to the Chargers in Brazil.

Tua Tagovailoa had one of his worst games as a pro, tossing two interceptions in Miami's lopsided loss to Indianapolis. Bo Nix threw two picks but Denver held on to defeat Tennessee.

"It's probably the toughest part of our position, in my opinion, is bouncing back from the negative because you work really hard, you aet one shot at it, and every once in a while when you miss it, it's tough because that's what you just want to think about it, you just want to fix it so bad that that's what you're thinking about," Nix said. "The real advantage, the real edge, is when guys can just go to the next play, move on. ... Glad it's Week 1, not Week 21 and make these mistakes now and learn from them."

Justin Herbert played in his first career preseason game this season, and came out firing against the Chiefs. He finished with 318 yards passing, three TDs and had a 131.7 rating for the Chargers.

Geno Smith appeared in all three preseason games, and looked like he was in midseason form in Week 1. Smith threw for 362 yards to lead Las Vegas to a win.

"I think it's all the time we spend together, all the time in the meeting rooms, just hearing his voice and directly from him exactly what he wants to get accomplished with each and every play," Smith said about building chemistry with offensive coordinator Chip Kelly.

Christopher Morel homers for the Tampa Bay Rays in return to Wrigley Field

CHICAGO (AP) — Christopher Morel made an immediate impact for Tampa Bay in his return to Wrigley Field.

Morel hit a three-run homer for the Rays in their series opener against the Chicago Cubs on Friday. The 26-year-old Morel was playing his first game against his first major league team.

Chandler Simpson hit a leadoff single and Yandy Díaz walked before Morel batted in the first inning against Matthew Boyd. After hearing some cheers from the crowd, Morel hit a towering drive into the bleachers in left-center.

He struck out looking in his second plate appearance of the afternoon.

Morel's 11th homer of the season provided a fast start for a Tampa Bay team on the fringe of the AL wild-card race. Coming into the day, the Rays had dropped five of six. With his energetic style and enthusiastic smile, Morel became a fan favorite in Chicago after making his major league debut in 2022. He hit 16 homers in his first season and 26 more the following year, when he batted .247 with 70 RBIs.

But the free-swinging Morel struck out 270 times in 220 games in his first two seasons, and the Cubs shipped him off to Tampa Bay in the Isaac Paredes deal in July 2024.

A'ja Wilson's incredible season earns her a second straight AP Player of the Year award

A'ja Wilson followed up a historic season with another incredible one to earn AP Player of the Year for the second straight time. The Las Vegas Aces star topped Napheesa Collier of Minnesota and Alyssa Thomas of Phoenix, who

both had terrific seasons. "She's put in the work and she passes all the tests the math tests, the optics tests she's the most exciting player in the W," Aces coach Becky Hammon told The Associated Press. "And here's the thing, she's also the most exciting player on the defensive

end. She will do something once a game defensively that's going to get you out of your seat. She's the only player in this league that I've seen that has defensive highlights on a consistent basis."

Wilson was also honored as the AP Defensive Player of the Year for the third time in four seasons.

"Considering coach (Dawn) Staley was so hard on me about my defense in college, I'm glad I can have some success at the pro level multiple times," Wilson told the AP.

The WNBA will announce its postseason awards over the course of the playoffs, which begin Sunday. Wilson is a huge favorite to win the WNBA MVP for the second straight season. Her odds at BetMGM Sportsbook to repeat dropped over the last week with her going from +650 to -350 on Thursday.

The AP voting is done by a 14-member national media panel that votes on the power poll each week. It's the 10th year of the awards.

Wilson once again led the league in scoring (23.4) as well as blocked shots (2.3). Paige Bueckers was honored as the AP Rookie of the Year. The Dallas Wings' No. 1 pick averaged 19.2 points and 5.4 assists in her first season. She also had a 44-point effort the highest scoring game of anyone in the WNBA this season. The former UConn star finished with the third most points ever by a rookie and second most assists.

"I am very grateful for everyone who voted and saw me fit for Rookie of the Year," Bueckers said. "I have always felt like individual awards are a way to acknowledge the team around you and that is exactly what this award means to me. My teammates, coaches, support staff and everyone from top to bottom in the entire Dallas Wings organization played a huge part in this."
